School He greatly admired the free handling of paint and the expression of soulfulness in the works of Theodore Rousseau Equally important were Inness's philosophical and spiritual concerns Along with contemporaries Ralph Waldo Emerson Elizabeth Barrett Browning and Walt Whitman Inness studied the writings of the Swedish scientist turned mystic Emanuel Swedenborg 1688 1772 During a trip to Italy in the early 1870s Inness began to structure his landscapes around geometric forms a development that may have reflected the Swedenborgian idea that the natural world corresponds to the spiritual world and that geometric forms possess spiritual identities Through these and other compositional devices Inness created paintings to inspire an almost religious experience in his viewers George Inness and the Visionary Landscape includes forty color reproductions of Inness's most important paintings and presents both a chronological overview of Inness's life and a more focused treatment of the artist's main philosophical and religious preoccupations It suggests resonances between Inness's visionary landscapes and the concurrent efforts on the part of the psychologist philosopher William James 1842 1910 to validate the existence of mystical states of mind It shows Inness to have anticipated many of the most important tenets of modernism an achievement that continues to inspire contemporary audiences George Inness George Inness, 1987

George Inness Elizabeth MacCausland, George Inness, 1956 **George Inness: Selected Paintings** Lorita Barchard, 2017-09-30 George Inness 1825 1894 was a prominent American landscape painter One of the most influential American artists of the nineteenth century Inness was influenced in turn by the Old Masters the Hudson River school the Barbizon school and finally the theology of Emanuel Swedenborg whose spiritualism found vivid expression in the work of Inness's maturity 1879 1894 Although Inness's style evolved through distinct stages over a prolific career that spanned more than forty years and 1 000 paintings his works consistently earned acclaim for their powerful coordinated efforts to elicit depth of mood atmosphere and emotion Neither pure realist nor impressionist Inness was a transitional figure who intended for his works to combine both the earthly and the ethereal in order to capture the complete essence of a locale A master of light color and shadow he became noted for creating highly ordered and complex scenes that often juxtaposed hazy or blurred elements with sharp and refined details to evoke an interweaving of both the physical and the spiritual nature of experience In Inness's words he attempted through his art to demonstrate the reality of the unseen and to connect the visible upon the invisible Within his own lifetime art critics hailed Inness as one of America's greatest artists Often called the father of American landscape painting Inness is best known for his mature works that not only exemplified the Tonalist movement but also displayed an original and uniquely American style **George Inness, Presence of the Unseen** George Inness, Gail Stavitsky, 1994 George Inness Adrienne Baxter Bell, 2006 Luminist Horizons celebrates the art and collection of James A Suydam 1819 1865 an American landscapist best known for his luminist paintings Despite the fact that his name has been linked with luminism since the term was first coined Suydam has not received the scholarly attention he deserves With approximately 180 reproductions eighty in color this book considers Suydam's work in tandem with that of fellow Hudson
