The region of northern New Mexico and southern Colorado holds a unique place in the world of Spanish folk literature. Isolated from the rest of the Spanish speaking world for most of its history since its first settlement in 1598 it has retained even into our own time much of its Hispanic folkloric heritage from the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries ballads songs poems folktales sayings anecdotes proverbs riddles and folk drama. Urban Los Angeles is the setting in which Elaine Miller has collected her narratives from Mexican Americans. The Mexican folk tradition varied and richly expressive of the inner life not only of a people but also of the individual as each lives it and personalizes it. It is abundantly present in the United States. Since it is in the urban centers that most Mexican Americans have lived this collection represents an important contribution to the study of that tradition and to the study of the changes urban life effects on traditional folklore. The collection includes sixty two legendary narratives and twenty traditional tales. The legendary narratives deal with the virgins and saints as well as with such familiar characters as the vanishing hitchhiker the headless horseman and the llorona. Familiar characters appear in the traditional tales Juan del Oso Blancaflor Pedro de Ordimalas and others. Elaine Miller concludes that the traditional tales are dying out in the city because tale telling itself is not suited to the fast pace of modern urban life and the situations

and characters in the tales are not perceived by the people to be meaningfully related to the everyday challenges and concerns of that life. The legendary tales survive longer in an urban setting because although containing fantastic elements they are related to the beliefs and hopes of the narrator even in the city one may be led to buried treasure on some dark night by a mysterious woman. The penchant of the informants for the fantastic in many of their tales often reflects their hopes and fears such as their dreams of suddenly acquiring wealth or their fears of being haunted by the dead. Miller closely observes the teller's relation to the stories to the duendes the nimas Death God the devil and she notes the tension on the part of the informant in his relation to their religion. The material is documented according to several standard tale and motif indices and is placed within the context of the larger body of Hispanic folk tradition by the citation of parallel versions throughout the Hispanic world. The tales transcribed from taped interviews are presented in colloquial Spanish accompanied by summaries in English.

A Folklorist's Progress Stith Thompson, 1996. The Life of Stith Thompson as revealed in these pages was in some ways ordinary in others extraordinary. Reading through A Folklorist's Progress one sees clearly the contours of an academic life in the midcentury United States. In an efficient manner Professor Thompson portrays the rounds of an academic of the period planning for courses establishing and revising programs attending international meetings and conferences working ideas into publications. He also describes the social domain with its cycle of parties receptions visits and social clubs. These autobiographical pages paint an engaging portrait of community organized around the life of the intellect. But not every scholar has the opportunity to found an academic field and in this light the career of Stith Thompson veers toward the extraordinary. Obituaries described Thompson as the father of folklore a journalistic label that with some qualifications epitomizes his scholarly career. While folklore studies existed in Europe well before Thompson's lifetime it was Stith Thompson who in 1949 conceived of a doctoral degree program in folklore the first in the U.S. Stith Thompson's success in securing support for the unknown discipline of folklore was due to his stature in the academic community his skill in dealing with the administrative structure of an American university and his ties to funding agencies the state department and scholarly societies all over the world.

Miller,2010-01-06 In Voice of the Leopard African Secret Societies and Cuba Ivor L Miller shows how African migrants and their political fraternities played a formative role in the history of Cuba During the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries no large kingdoms controlled Nigeria and Cameroon's multilingual Cross River basin Instead each settlement had its own lodge of the initiation society called kp or leopard which was the highest indigenous authority kp lodges ruled local communities while also managing regional and long distance trade Cross River Africans enslaved and forcibly brought to colonial Cuba reorganized their kp clubs covertly in Havana and Matanzas into a mutual aid society called Abaku which became foundational to Cuba's urban life and music Miller's extensive fieldwork in Cuba and West Africa documents ritual languages and practices that survived the Middle Passage and evolved into a unifying charter for transplanted slaves and their successors To gain deeper understanding of the material Miller underwent kp initiation rites in Nigeria after ten years collaboration with Abaku initiates in Cuba and the United States He argues that Cuban music art and even politics rely on complexities of these African inspired codes of conduct and leadership Voice of the Leopard is an unprecedented tracing of an African title society to its Caribbean incarnation which has deeply influenced Cuba's creative energy and popular consciousness
