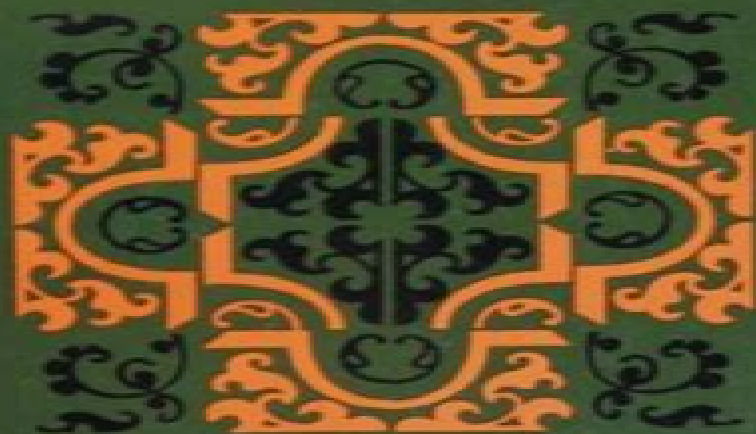

D. Cousins,2014-07-21 Alongside Spenser Sidney and the early Donne Shakespeare is the major poet of the 16th century largely because of the status of his remarkable sequence of sonnets Professor Cousins new book is the first comprehensive study of the Sonnets and narrative poems for over a decade He focuses in particular on their exploration of self knowledge sexuality and death as well as on their ambiguous figuring of gender Throughout he provides a comparative context looking at the work of Shakespeare s contemporaries The relation between Shakespeare s non dramatic verse and his plays is also explored Power in Verse Jane Hedley,2010-11 English lyric poetry from Wyatt to Donne falls into three consecutive stylistic phases Tottel s Miscellany presided over the first making the lyrics of Wyatt and Surrey available for imitation by mid century poets like Barnabe Googe

George Turberville and George Gascoigne *The Shepheardes Calender* and Sidney's *Defense of Poesy* ushered in the second the Elizabethan or Golden phase of the 1580s and 1590s In the third phase Donne and Jonson reacting against the stylistic orientation of the Elizabethan poets reconceived the status of poesy and resituated the lyric for a post Elizabethan audience Chapter 7 is shared between Donne and Jonson post Elizabethan writers who used metonymy to subvert the metaphoric stance of Elizabethan poetry In a Postscript Hedley takes on the metaphysical conceit for a final demonstration of the explanatory power of Jakobson's theory of language Professor Hedley uses the semiotic theory of Roman Jakobson to create stylistic profiles for each of these three phases of early Renaissance poetry Along with the poetry itself she reexamines contemporary treatises defenses and notes of instruction to highlight key features of poetic practice She proposes that early and mid Tudor poetry is metonymic that the collective orientation of the Elizabethan poets is metaphoric and that Donne and Jonson bring metonymy to the fore once again Chapter 1 sets out the essentials of Jakobson's theory Hedley uses particular poems to show what is involved in claiming that a writer or a piece of writing has metaphoric or a metonymic basis Chapter 2 explains how the metaphoric bias of Elizabethan poetry was produced as poesy became part of England's national identity This chapter broadens out beyond the lyric to include other modes of writing whose emergence belongs to an Elizabethan moment in the history of English literature Beyond chapter 2 each chapter has a double purpose to create stylistic profile for a single poetic generation and to highlight a particular aspect or feature of the poetry as an index of difference from one generation to the next In the third chapter Hedley shows how Wyatt and Surrey used deixis metonymically to give their poems particular occasions Chapter 4 explains how the metonymic bias of the mid Tudor poets affected their use of metaphor and highlights Gascoigne's appreciation of a metaphor as a social gambit or an instrument of moral suasion Chapters 5 and 6 are centered in the Elizabethan period but with perspectives into earlier and subsequent phases of metonymic writing In chapter 5 a comprehensive discussion of the sonnet and the sonnet sequence shows how metaphoric writing cooperates with the poetic function of language Chapter 6 deals with love poetry as a social political activity whose orientation differs radically from one generation of English Petrarchists to the next

Metaphor and Belief in *The Faerie Queene* Rufus Wood, 1997-08-29 Rufus Wood contextualizes his study of *The Faerie Queene* through an initial discussion of attitudes towards metaphor expressed in Elizabethan poetry He reveals how Elizabethan writers voice a commitment to metaphor as a means of discovering and exploring their world and shows how the concept of a metaphoric principle of structure underlying Elizabethan poetics generates an exciting interpretation of *The Faerie Queene* The debate which emerges concerning the use and abuse of metaphor in allegorical poetry provides a valuable contribution to the field of Spenser studies in particular and Renaissance literature in general

Domestic and Heroic in Tennyson's Poetry Donald S. Hair, 1981-12-15 Tennyson shared the assumptions of his age concerning the value of family life and treated the domestic as the source of the heroic in both action and character This book provides a critical examination of these major Victorian themes as they appear in Tennyson's

poetry and demonstrates how the poet's assumptions illuminate his use of elegy, idyll and epyllion and his treatment of romance. Professor Hair analyses *In Memoriam*, the English Idylls, *The Princess* and *Idylls of the King*; he examines Tennyson's view of the family as the model of social order, a civilizing influence on the nation and a place where the greater man or hero is nurtured, and he reveals how much of Tennyson's poetry explores the link between domestic and heroic. He also discusses the patterns into which these pervasive domestic concerns fall, with emphasis on the most significant separation and reunions. The myth of Demeter and Persephone, the Biblical story of Ruth and the Sleeping Beauty fairy tale are all versions of Tennyson's treatment of this pattern. The English Idylls and other idylls and epyllia are explored as varying combinations of romance, satire, tragedy, comedy and irony, with a detailed analysis of *The Princess*, the most complex of these medleys. *Idylls of the King*, wherein the fate of Camelot rests on the marriage of Arthur and Guinevere, is treated as the fullest exploration of the link between domestic and heroic.

The New Poet Richard Danson Brown, 1999-01-01 This gracefully written and well thought out study deals with a neglected collection of poems by Spenser which was issued in 1591 at the height of his career. While there has been a good deal written in recent years on two of the poems in the collection, *Mother Hubbard's Tale* and *Muiopotmos*, Brown innovatively addresses the collection in its entirety. He urges us to see it as a planned whole with a consistent design on the reader; he fully acknowledges and even brings out further the heterogeneity of the collection, but he examines it nevertheless as a sustained reflection on the nature of poetry and the auspices for writing in a modern world, distancing itself from the traditions of the immediate past. The strength of this work lies both in the originality of its project and in the precision and enterprise of the close reading that informs its argument. Interest in the concern of Spenser's poetry with the nature of poetry is in the current critical mainstream, but here the attentiveness is both unusually focused and unusually sustained. Brown garners more than would be expected from the translations in the *Complaints*, while at the same time including striking and individual chapters on the better known *Mother Hubbard's Tale* and *Muiopotmos*; he advances understanding of these extremely subtle texts and fully justifies his wider approach to the collection as a whole. Arguing that Spenser's relationship to literary tradition is more complex than is often thought, Brown suggests that Spenser was a self-conscious innovator whose gradual move away from traditional poetics is exhibited by the different texts in the *Complaints*. He further suggests that the *Complaints* are a poetics in practice which progress from traditional ideas of poetry to a new poetry that emerges through Spenser's transformation of traditional complaint.
