providers is estimated to increase to 12 9 million by 2035 This disproportionately affects resource scarce countries denying basic health care to millions and limiting access to life saving treatments Due to limited resources in these countries not enough health professionals receive training few have the opportunity for continuing education and the ability to develop or implement educational programs and curricula is constrained Additionally many existing providers choose to emigrate in pursuit of professional advancement opportunities contributing to the overall shortage of qualified health care providers in these environments Efforts to strengthen health workforce capacity not only increases access safety and availability of care but is critical to building resilient health systems capable of caring for the world's neediest populations.
