Guilhermina Suggia: Cellist Anita Mercier, 2017-07-05 Born in 1885 in Porto Portugal to a middle class musical family Guilhermina Suggia began playing cello at the age of five A child prodigy she was already a seasoned performer when she won a scholarship to study with Julius Klengel in Leipzig at the age of sixteen Suggia lived in Paris with fellow cellist Pablo Casals for several years before World War I in a professional and personal partnership that was as stormy as it was unconventional When they separated Suggia moved to London where she built a spectacularly successful solo career Suggia's virtuosity and musicianship along with the magnificent style and stage presence famously captured in Augustus John's portrait made her one of the most sought after concert artists of her day In 1927 she married Dr Jos Asimiro Carteado Mena and settled down to a comfortable life divided between Portugal and England Throughout the 1930s Suggia remained one of the most respected musicians in Europe She partnered on stage with many famous instrumentalists and conductors and completed numerous BBC broadcasts The war years kept her at home in Portugal where she focused on teaching but she returned to England directly after the war and resumed performing When Suggia died in 1950 her will provided for the establishment of several scholarship funds for young cellists including England's prestigious Suggia Gift Mercier's study of Suggia's letters and other writings reveal an intelligent warm and generous character an artist who was enormously dedicated knowledgeable and self disciplined Suggia was one of the first women to make a career of playing the cello at a time when prejudice against women playing this traditionally masculine instrument was still strong A role model for many other musicians she was herself a fearless pioneer

Hilda Hurricane Roberto Drummond, 2011-07-15 Eighteen year old Hilda known as the girl in the gold bikini when she swam at her country club in Belo Horizonte Brazil abruptly leaves the gilded life to take up residence in room 304 of the Hotel Marvelous as a prostitute There she becomes Hilda Hurricane an erotic force of nature no man can resist The exception is reporter narrator Roberto Drummond who attempts to unravel the mystery of why the girl in the gold bikini would forego a comfortable life to join the world's oldest profession While some in Belo Horizonte cheer Hilda's liberated lifestyle others seek to have her moved outside the city limits and a would be saint cannot seem to finish the exorcism he began outside the Hotel Marvelous Set against the social and political upheaval of the 1960s Hilda's story seduces even as Drummond becomes aware of more ominous forces approaching Belo Horizonte Hilda

Gaspar Cassadó Gabrielle Kaufman,2016-12-08 Barcelonian Gaspar Cassad 1897 1966 was one of the greatest cello virtuosos of the twentieth century and a notable composer and arranger leaving a vast and heterogeneous legacy In this book Gabrielle Kaufman provides the first full length scholarly work dedicated to Cassad containing the results of seven years of research into his life and legacy after following the cellist s steps through Spain France Italy and Japan The study presents in depth descriptions of the three main parts of Cassad s creative output composition transcription and performance especially focusing on Cassad s plural and multi faceted creativity which is examined from both cultural and historical perspectives

Cassad's role within the evolution of twentieth century cello performance is thoroughly examined including a discussion regarding the musical and technical aspects of performing Cassad's works aimed directly at performers. The study presents the first attempt at a comprehensive catalogue of Cassad's works both original and transcribed as well as his recordings using a number of new archival sources and testimonies. In addition the composer's significance within Spanish twentieth century music is treated in detail through a number of case studies sustained by examples from recovered score manuscripts. Illuminated by extraordinary source material, Gaspar Cassad: Cellist, Composer and Transcriber expands and deepens our knowledge of this complex figure and will be of crucial importance to students and scholars in the fields of Performance Practice and Spanish Music as well as to professional cellists and advanced cello students.

Steps of Courage Bettina Hoerlin, 2011. This riveting love story revolving around two extraordinary individuals plays out against some of the most profound markers of the 20th century: Hitler's Germany, the American immigrant experience and growing threats of the nuclear age. Hermann Hoerlin and Kate Tietz Schmid meet in 1934; he, a handsome world record holding mountaineer and aspiring physicist, is a staunch anti-fascist and she, part of Munich's intellectual and musical elite, is a stunning widow whose husband was murdered by the Nazis. To have a future together, Hoerlin as she called him and Kate must flee Germany. Standing in their way is a major obstacle: the Nuremberg Laws prohibiting relationships between Aryans and Jews. Against formidable odds and with the direct assistance of a few good Nazis, Kate and Hoerlin manage to marry and immigrate to the United States. However, as enemy aliens during World War II, they face new adversities. Life finally returns to normal with the help of influential friends, including a connection with Eleanor Roosevelt. And in a strange twist, Hoerlin contributes to the war effort with his extensive European mountaineering maps that help guide Allied reconnaissance missions. In 1953, Hoerlin and Kate pull up stakes again, moving to the Atomic City of Los Alamos, where Hoerlin works at the forefront of the first nuclear test ban treaty. Again, he is brought under scrutiny, this time because of McCarthyism and Hoerlin's links with the American left wing. The book spans an era from the rise of Nazism, when a diabolic dictator sets out to annihilate Jews, to the depths of the Cold War, when weapons of mass destruction threaten to annihilate humankind. In their remarkable odyssey, Kate and Hoerlin befriend cultural and scientific icons such as the philosopher Oswald Spengler, cellist Pablo Casals, conductor Wilhelm Furtwängler, painter Georgia O'Keeffe, and Nobel prize winning physicist Hans Bethe. Their daughter, Bettina Hoerlin, draws on a treasure trove of over 500 love letters and previously untapped archival records to create a universal tale of courage.

Stradivari's Genius Toby Faber, 2012-05-09. 'Tis God gives skill but not without men's hands. He could not make Antonio Stradivari's violins without Antonio. George Eliot. Antonio Stradivari, 1644-1737, was a perfectionist whose single-minded pursuit of excellence changed the world of music. In the course of his long career in the northern Italian city of Cremona, he created more than a thousand stringed instruments; approximately six hundred survive. In this fascinating book, Toby Faber traces the rich, multilayered stories of six of these peerless instruments: five violins and a

cello and the one towering artist who brought them into being Blending history biography meticulous detective work and an abiding passion for music Faber embarks on an absorbing journey as he follows some of the most prized instruments of all time Mysteries and unanswered questions proliferate from the outset starting with the enigma of Antonio Stradivari himself What made this apparently unsophisticated craftsman so special Why were his techniques not maintained by his successors How is it that even two and a half centuries after his death no one has succeeded in matching the purity depth and delicacy of a Stradivarius In Faber s illuminating narrative each of the six fabled instruments becomes a character in its own right a living entity cherished by artists bought and sold by princes and plutocrats coveted collected hidden lost copied and occasionally played by a musician whose skill matches its maker s Here is the fabulous Viotti named for the virtuoso who enchanted all Paris in the 1780s only to fall foul of the French Revolution Paganini supposedly made a pact with the devil to transform the art of the violin and by the end of his life he owned eleven Strads Then there s the Davidov cello fashioned in 1712 and lovingly handed down through a succession of celebrated artists until in the 1980s it passed into the capable hands of Yo Yo Ma From the salons of Vienna to the concert halls of New York from the breakthroughs of Beethoven s last quartets to the first phonographic recordings Faber unfolds a narrative magnificent in its range and brilliant in its detail A great violin is alive said Yehudi Menuhin of his own Stradivarius In the pages of this book Faber invites us to share the life the passion the intrigue and the incomparable beauty of the world s most marvelous stringed instruments *Marcel Tabuteau* Laila Storch,2018-05-01 Laila Storch is a world renowned oboist in her own right but her book honors Marcel Tabuteau one of the greatest figures in twentieth century music Tabuteau studied the oboe from an early age at the Paris Conservatoire and was brought to the United States in 1905 by Walter Damrosch to play with the New York Symphony Orchestra Although this posed a problem for the national musicians union he was ultimately allowed to stay and the rest as they say is history Eventually moving to Philadelphia Tabuteau played in the Philadelphia Orchestra and taught at the Curtis Institute of Music ultimately revamping the oboe world with his performance pedagogical and reed making techniques In 1941 Storch auditioned for Tabuteau at the Curtis Institute but was rejected because of her gender After much persistence and several cross country bus trips she was eventually accepted and began a life of study with Tabuteau Blending archival research with personal anecdotes and including access to rare recordings of Tabuteau and Waldemar Wolsing Storch tells a remarkable story in an engaging style *Tales from the Locker Room* Lawrence Angell,Bernette Jaffe,2019-11 One of the greatest conductors of the 20th century George Szell led the Cleveland Orchestra from 1946 until his death in 1970 A meticulous perfectionist Szell was known to be an autocratic taskmaster who wielded total artistic control Under his leadership he transformed the orchestra into a world class ensemble *Tales From the Locker Room* gives a rare honest humorous and at times brutal look at this musical genius through first hand interviews stories and anecdotes by members of the Cleveland Orchestra who served under him *Always Something New to Discover* Cynthia Wilson, German born pianist Menahem

Pressler 1923 was forced to flee Nazi terror to Israel He quickly attained international fame in 1946 by winning the Debussy Competition in San Francisco and performing his d but with Eugene Ormandy and The Philadelphia Orchestra Ultimately emigrating to the United States Pressler teaches at the Jacobs School of Music of Indiana University where he holds an endowed chair as Distinguished Professor As founding member of the Beaux Arts Trio he alone survived the ensemble s changes in membership during its unprecedented 53 year history Setting the standard for piano trio performance the Beaux Arts Trio elevated the ensemble type to a par with the string quartet in over seven thousand performances hundreds of award winning recordings and extensive broadcasts *Adolf Busch* ,
