From That Place and Time: A Memoir, 1938-1947 Lucy S. German Jew within a predominantly Lithuanian Jewish community which was part of a white settler community itself a minority in a predominantly black African territory A young settler reprimanded him for stepping out of the way of an African family on a narrow bush path Walk straight on They must know who is the master in the land Fraenkel found himself whistling the Nazis anthem Clear the streets for the brown battalions The storm troopers are marching He was coming to learn the importance of not conforming A vivid account of a childhood in a middleclass non observant Jewish family in Nazi Germany forced to emigrate to Zambia then Northern Rhodesia in 1939 Trevor Gundry Jewish Chronicle Peter Fraenkel and his family emigrated in 1939 from Breslau to Northern Rhodesia where he forged a successful career in the Central African Broadcasting Service Fraenkel was thus given the opportunity of using his undoubted skills as a broadcaster to help in the education of black people using new methods of mass education his sojourn in Northern Rhodesia came to an end in 1957 a few years after the country was refashioned by the British government as the Federation of Rhodesia and Nyasaland a big mistake Fraenkel thinks and one that wasn't undone until much later when the independent state of Zambia was created His love affair with Africa came to an end and he felt impelled to leave because of his dislike of racist politics in this bastion of white privilege Peter Fraenkel's account of the 20 years in Northern Rhodesia is absorbing there are riveting chapters on his activities as a somewhat subversive broadcaster working together with like minded whites and Blacks The book is written in a very lively manner and there are countless anecdotes many of them in direct speech I recommend it strongly Leslie Baruch Brent Association of Jewish Refugees The book bursts with life Countries like these Central African territories are far more exciting than countries with a settled structure Here a new society is emerging This excitement is lost in official reports and academic studies and one of Fraenkel's achievements is that he conveys it in full measure I know of no book which more vividly describes the variety and throb of a modern African township Max Gluckman The Observer He brings out the formation of the new African metropolitan and rural societies I know of no book which describes this surging varied vitality so well Africa

Before Golda: Manya Shochat Rachel Yanait Ben-Zvi, 2019-08-18 Manya Shochat was a truly unusual woman a figure of extreme complexity who might have come out of a nineteenth century Russian novel In her life's story we find a full enactment rare in one person of the main qualities some of them contradictory which played such a prominent role in the history of Zionism She was incredibly tough and unbelievably charitable sentimental and fearless a fanatic Zionist and a fanatic socialist a co founder of Ha shomer an armed organization of settlers whose motto was In blood and fire Judea fell in blood and fire she shall rise again and at the same time a leading member of the left wing anti nationalist League for Arab Jewish Understanding She was fully convinced that Arab acquiescence to Zionism could be achieved through the raising of Arab standards of living and yet on lecture tours abroad on behalf of Poale Zion and her kibbutz she passionately admonished the wealthier Jews of America that high living standards were meaningless only national dignity counted Already before her arrival in the country in January 1904 she had achieved some notoriety in Russian revolutionary circles by running arms for

anecdotes about the great chemist Willstatter was associated with during the course of his remarkable career David H. Kenny Journal of Chemical Education This autobiography is one of the outstanding books printed in Germany in recent years and it provides an insight into the thinking and working methods of a great scientist The Chemist Great scientists are rare but great writers among them are almost unique Willstatter's autobiography published posthumously and edited by his former student Arthur Stoll is an extremely moving book This wonderful book could with profit be made adjunct reading in an advanced organic chemistry course Record of Chemical Progress Willstatter's knowledge of chemistry and chemical problems was encyclopedic and as unlimited as the kindness he showed me At a meeting of the Munich university senate some time in 1928 a discussion had arisen about the appointment of a mineralogist A candidate was proposed a front rank mineralogist by the name of Goldschmidt As soon as the name was mentioned a murmur arose in the meeting and someone remarked Wieder ein Jude another Jew Without saying a word Willstatter rose collected his papers and left the room He never crossed the threshold of the university again Although his reputation was immense and he was a Nobel prize winner he was modest unassuming and retiring in character he often reminded me of the old time venerable type of great Jewish Rabbi For a long time Willstatter refused to understand what was taking place in Germany to my repeated and insistent pleas that he leave Germany and come to us in Palestine he turned a deaf ear He came to the opening of the Daniel Sieff Research later Weizmann Institute in Rehovot and returned to Germany in 1934 He still felt that he was protected by his reputation and by the devotion of the Munich public His last word on the subject was I know that Germany has gone mad but if a mother falls ill it is not a reason for her children to leave her My home is Germany my university in spite of what has happened is in Munich I must return Chaim Weizmann Trial and Error

Hotel Bolivia: The Culture of Memory in a Refuge from Nazism Leo Spitzer, 2019-08-09 Desperate to escape the increasingly vehement persecution in their homelands thousands of refugees from Nazi dominated Central Europe the majority of them Jews found refuge in Latin America in the 1930s Bolivia became a principal recipient of this influx one of the few remaining places in the entire world to accept Jewish refugees after the German Anschluss of Austria in 1938 Some 20 000 refugees arrived in Bolivia more than in Canada Australia New Zealand South Africa the leading British Commonwealth countries combined In Bolivia the refugees began to reconstruct a version of the world that they had been forced to abandon Their own origins and social situations had been diverse in Central Europe ranging across generational class educational and political differences and incorporating various professional craft and artistic backgrounds But it was Austro German Jewish bourgeois society that provided them with a model for emulation and a common locus for identification in their place of refuge Indeed at the very time when that dynamic social and cultural amalgam was being ruthlessly and systematically destroyed by the Nazis the Jewish refugees in Bolivia attempted to recall and revive a version of it in a land thousands of miles from their home in a country that offered them a haven but in which many of them felt themselves as mere sojourners Hotel Bolivia explores an important but generally neglected aspect of the
